
And never, ever quit. No matter how slow your progress, never give up. Pursue your God with the diligence of which the most important task in the world is worthy.

And victory is "Not I, but Christ." (Gal. 2:20)

We're terribly confused. We don't understand.

# HOW CAN I BECOME A VICTORIOUS CHRISTIAN?

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## **The Root Sins**

Sin is our problem. Not the sins of adultery and murder and theft, and lying. Not even anger and impatience and lovelessness. At least these are not the root sins with which we need to concern ourselves, but pride and selfishness.

These are the root sins that separate us from God. They were the first sin – the devil’s and Eve’s.

My problem is not that I am not as good as I should be, that I lose my temper or become impatient. My problem is that I am eccentric.

## **We’re Eccentric**

I am off-center. My center has been removed from God in Christ by the power of the Spirit where it belongs, to myself where it does not belong.

An eccentric (off-center) wheel is likely to tear things apart. Just think of a car wheel that is off center, going down the road at fifty-five. How

long will it be before everything starts flying apart? Not long at all!

So now you know what is wrong. You’re prideful and selfish because you’re centered in yourself instead of in Christ.

So now you know what has to change. You must be centered in Christ, not yourself.

So just tell the Lord that you choose to be centered on Him, not yourself, henceforth!

Right?

No, wrong again.

## **No Quick Fixes**

Not only do we ask the wrong question, and give the wrong answer, we look for quick fixes that aren’t there.

After Saul became the Christian, Paul, God rushed him off to spend years in

the desert where He changed his center and focus.

Moses spent forty years in the desert learning to listen to God.

God has a terrible time getting and keeping our attention. Sometimes He gets our attention through permitting illness or financial failure or family trouble. But even in this, do we turn our whole hearts to Him, or do we practice fox-hole Christianity? “Get me out of this, Lord, and I’ll serve you forever” - a promise as quickly forgotten as made.

## **We’re Still Self-Centered**

We have been self-centered all our lives and simply do not yield ourselves to Christ-centeredness readily or soon.

Oh, we think we do, only to find over and over again that we haven’t.

The “I” remains large even in the quest for victory. The victory we seek is “spiritual success” rather
